PiLam Returns to Broad Street

Since refunding in 2009, the PA Alpha Delta Chapter has called 1520 N. 17th Street it's home. The beautiful, historical row home between Oxford and Jefferson streets has been witness to the last 10 years of chapter history, and the many brothers who have passed through its halls. However, after years of dilapidation and significant chapter growth, it is no longer suitable for the chapter's needs. Last rush, our chapter had over 175 potential new members, and during rush events it was almost impossible to fit everyone inside the small house. Socials with sororities during the winter are almost impossible without being able to fit in a third of the group attending. With around 73 active brothers at the end of this semester, having only 13 spots makes living in the house competitive and difficult. Holding chapter meetings in the small Chapter Room is nearly impossible.

Last fall, one of our newer brothers, Alex Rosenberg ('17) was evicted from his apartment building on Broad Street. Upon moving out, he discovered that the new owners desired to house a fraternity in the building's new configuration. The rest of course, is history. We partnered with Kameron Zitelli of XIX Companies who will be managing the property for us.

The new PA Alpha Delta Chapter House will be residing in the historical, 4-story 10,000 square foot 1432 North Broad Street, located at the corner of Broad and Jefferson. The

house will board up to 30 members of PA Alpha Delta per year. Notable features include a newly expanded Jerome R. Balka Chapter Room, a newly dedicated Alfred Kovner Memorial Hall, an Executive Board lounge featuring original restored woodwork from the house's construction, 4 additional living rooms, six kitchens, a weight room, cookout porch, backyard, and more. The house is 50 paces from Rite Aid, 100 paces from the Fresh Grocer, and can be seen diagonal from the steps of Morgan Hall, currently Temple's largest dorm. The process for hosing

selection was so competitive, we had more brothers than spaces available, and are gearing up for potentially the most exciting room selection draft in recent chapter history.

We are truly excited to bring PiLam back to Broad Street, and are grateful such an amazing opportunity opened up for us at a time when the chapter's momentum on Temple's campus is red hot. We hope having this new platform will help us continue this momentum into the next few years as PiLam sets the standard for Greek life in Temple's Inter-Fraternity Council.

PiLam sets New Standards in 2018 University Accreditation

The core of Temple University's evaluation of Fraternity and Sorority life is the Diamond Accreditation process. This deep audit of each chapter occurs every spring, and allows the University to examine the standards of each chapter to ensure they are living up to the school's standards. Over the last year, Pi Lambda Phi has exceeded expectations, and has come out as a leader in almost every category measured during the auditing process. With a cumulative GPA of 3.18 and rising, Pi Lambda Phi has not only attained the highest GPA in the Inter-Fraternity Council, but also out of all male Greek organizations on campus. Our academic plan has received high praise from University officials, being

described as "The most detailed and well-executed academic plan [Temple] has ever seen" at the Student Organization Awards Ceremony in April where PA Alpha Delta was awarded the highest honor for Academics and Standards.

In addition to the honors for academics, PA Alpha Delta was also recognized for having an outstanding Chapter Advisor in Alex Billotte who has been incredibly supportive of the chapter in recent years during both good times and bad. Pi Lambda Phi was the only Inter-Fraternity Council member to be recognized at the awards, and was the only Greek organization to be awarded twice. In the midst of

our achievement, we have been asked by administration to serve as a mentor chapter for Pi Kappa Phi, the IFC's newest addition, which will be chartering next spring. Our Executive Board will be working with them to help them establish their presence and instill good practices in running their chapter.

Additionally, we have been invited by the University to mentor struggling IFC chapters in an effort to raise the IFC's standards overall. We are incredibly grateful to have recruited several successive classes of high-achieving and well invested men, who we hope to continue the trend of keeping PiLam at the forefront of Temple Greek Life.

PiLam partners with Queer Student Union in EOP Week

One of the most important things to Pi Lambda Phi is our national philanthropy, the Elimination of Prejudice. Every chapter meeting we speak the creed, vowing to uphold freedom which implies the Elimination of Prejudice. Now more than ever, this message resonates with the college community where social issues are dominating the conversation. That is why the PA Alpha Delta Chapter wanted to take advantage our platform as a greek organization to challenge stereotypes and put our mission out there for the university to see.

PiLam partnered with the Queer Student Union to run the Eliminate Prejudice at Temple Week April 23 – 27. Central to the events was the “Wall of Prejudice”, a wall constructed outside Ritter Hall where students could write about times they felt they were marginalized or experienced prejudice. This would lead to a discussion with PiLam brothers and members of the Queer Student Union about these experiences. It was a great learning experience, and helped show the Temple community that PiLam is more than just a frat, and wants to be supportive of the progressive changes college culture is going through. In addition to the week-long wall event, we also hosted a short film screening with selected films from the Queer Film Collective and a discussion and talkback panel at IDEAL, the University’s Institutional Diversity office.

We were happy that our statement was well received by the Temple community, and hope our house will be a safe space for everyone at Temple for years to come.

We fully stand by the Temple University Administration in their ongoing investigation regarding the matter, and hope they will invest all of the necessary resources to improve and increase its efforts to fight these issues on and off campus.

We would like to encourage members of the Temple community who feel that they have been victimized to speak out against any problems within Temple Greek life or Temple University as a whole. We encourage victims to utilize the many resources provided by Temple and to seek help where they feel it is needed. We, as an organization, have taken decisive steps in the fight against sexual assault and will continue to utilize our platform as a fraternity to generate awareness and stand in support for those who have been victimized. We will also continue to take action against those who seek to promote injustice, intolerance, and violence while promoting and working with the many groups at Temple that advocate for inclusivity, tolerance, and safety. We understand that it is our responsibility to speak out for any change we feel is necessary within our community and we hope that this statement serves as a positive example of what Greek life at Temple stands for.

PiLam Featured in Temple News

Story on Increased GPAs Across Greek Life Focuses on Academic Successes of Pi Lambda Phi

In September the Temple News did a feature looking at an across the board increase in GPAs among greek organizations at Temple University. The focus of this article was connecting it to the implementation of a “deferred recruitment policy” in 2015.

This new policy prevented first semester freshmen and students with less than 12 credits from attempting to join a greek organization, and has been accredited as a contributing factor to the increase in GPAs in greek life.

Prior to the implementation of the policy, the university did not have any academic requirements of new members. Now, the university requires 12 credits and a 2.5 GPA. This however, is still under the standard of Pi Lambda Phi which requires a minimum GPA of 2.75 for all of it’s new

members and requires it’s members to stay above a 2.75 for the entirety of their membership.

This occurred as the chapter was implementing it’s new “tier system” academic plan, which has not only provide positive results but has

caught the attention of the University who awarded the chapter for Excellence in Standards and Academics for the 2018 school year. PiLam is looking forward to another successful year in academics, and strong performance from all of it’s members striving to earn their degree.

Brothers to be “Safe Zone” Trained

While working on the Elimination of Prejudice Week project, it came to the attention of the leadership that the Office of Student activities has a program for students to obtain “Safe Zone” training. The Safe Zone project is a free resource for creating “powerful, effective LGBTQ awareness and ally training” through workshops.

As an organization who’s central philanthropy is the Elimination of Prejudice, we think that having brothers participate in this training could be a great informative way to engage with our cause and continue our work on the Elimination of Prejudice, even after the conclusion of EOP week.

We plan on conducting these trainings starting at the beginning of the Fall semester, with potentially a few member participating over the summer, and look forward to the benefits it could have for our chapter’s engagement.





Uncovering Chapter History

Digging Deep into Paley Library's Special Collections on Greek Life

This past year, brothers of PA Alpha Delta have spent time researching our past and restoring our history to the chapter house. As we prepare to move, the chapter has raised internal funds to finance the restoration of 13 digitized composites to decorate the halls of our new chapter house. In the process of doing so however, we dug deeper into the archives that Temple University has kept on greek life through past yearbooks and docu-

ments found in the Special Collections department of Paley Library.

Most recently, it was discovered while going over the 1927 Phi Beta Delta class record that the chapter was founded three years prior in 1924 as Sigma Iota Sigma, a local fraternity and the only chapter to ever exist. Sigma Iota Sigma was one of the founding members of Temple University's Inter-Fraternity Council, how-

ever as a local organization did not have access to the benefits that national fraternities had. As a result, they were accepted to merge with Phi Beta Delta in 1927, which of course would go on to merge with Pi Lambda Phi in 1941.

As we continue to re-record our history in new archives, we learn more about the brothers that came before us at Temple University.
